2007 Gathering of Great Lakes Nations

Two thunderstorms blew through the Tri-State Tractor and Engine Grounds on Friday while everyone was trying to set up for the June 9 and 10 4th Annual Gathering. After the second storm, the humidity dropped and temperature cooled. The weather for the remainder of the weekend couldn't have been better for this celebration of the Great Lakes Native American culture. Everyone loved the shade from all the trees. The 14 Native American vendors gave spectators and participants plenty of excellent shopping opportunities. The pre-1840 living history camp grew to 7 camps and gave a greater appreciation of life at that time. Nearly 50 people of all ages danced to Host Drum Painted Turtle, Black Swamp Drum and Craig White's Southern Drum and singers.

Sunday afternoon NCGLNAC and those in attendance were greatly honored when Head Veteran George Dorin, Chief of the Eagle Clan of the Indiana Miami Nation, presented an eagle feather to his son Greg Dorin and to his grandson Jason Dorin while surrounded by family members. The presentation of an eagle feather is the highest honor for Native American people. During the ceremony George Dorin recalled that he had been presented the two eagle feathers when he was a young man who had just returned home from military service to his country. When George said he had not done anything to deserve such an honor, the elder presenting him with the two eagle feathers said, "It is not what you have done, but what you will be expected to do." Greg Dorin has been NCGLNAC's Gathering Emcee since the beginning and Jason was this year's Arena Director. Thank you, George, for honoring NCGLNAC as a part of this sacred ceremony.


More Upcoming Workshops

NCGLNAC has three more one-day workshops planned for 2007, all in Portland. The flyers for two of these workshops are inserted in this newsletter. All workshops are from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Cost of the workshops varies.

On August 25, native plant expert Dani Tippmann, NCGLNAC Advisory Board member and also a member of the Miami Tribe of Oklahoma, will conduct a workshop about native plants and their food, technical and some of their historic medicinal uses. This workshop will be held at the Jay County Historical Society Museum.

September 22 marks the date that award-winning, internationally-known gourd artist Carolyn Rushton will teach a lidded gourd container workshop at the Jay County Public Library.

Boni Nelson, NCGLNAC Board member and well-known artist and porcupine quillworker, is of Cherokee descent and will teach a children's workshop on November 3 at the Jay County Public Library. More information on this workshop will be included in the October Newsletter.



Local Arts Director Honored

Eric Rogers, Executive Director of Portland's Arts Place, is the 2007 recipient of a prestigious national arts leadership award. During the annual meeting of Americans for the Arts last month in Las Vegas, Rogers was presented the 2007 Selina Robert Ottum Award for Arts Leadership. Arts Place is a regional arts council serving 16 counties in East Central Indiana and West Central Ohio. Rogers has been Director since 1976.

According to Robert L. Lynch, president and CEO of Americans for the Arts, "Eric Rogers has established himself as an indefatigable arts leader."
