session. The film chronicles Mills' early life and his journey from Pine Ridge Indian Reservation to the 1964 Tokyo Olympics. He will also be signing his book, *Wokini: A Lakota Journey to Happiness and Self-Understanding*.

Myaamia Center Awarded NSF Grant

The Myaamia Center at Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, has received a \$167,850 grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF) for a project titled "*Breath of Life Archival Institute for Indigenous Languages*." Principal investigator is Daryl Baldwin, director of the Myaamia Center.

The funding is part of the Documenting Endangered Languages program, a joint effort of NSF and the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) which recently awarded \$4 million in 27 awards to document languages that are losing speakers.

When language is lost also lost is a sense of indigenous identity for those who never had the chance to learn their own language. More and more indigenous peoples are recognizing the need to maintain or regain their own language. *Breath of Life* is designed to help American Indian communities meet that need. Myaamia Center will be working closely with the Smithsonian Institution's Recovering Voices Program. *Breath of Life* is unique in providing archival access for native language activists and scholars. Participants are teamed with linguists serving as mentors.

 Fall Friendship Fire Celebration – October 25 and 26, 2014
 Women’s Building, Jay County Fairgrounds, Portland, Indiana**

Several activities and events are planned for the 2014 NCGLNAC Fall Friendship Fire Celebration, October 25 and 26. Activities will be held at the Women’s Building of the Jay County Fairgrounds (Morton and Votaw Streets) and at the NCGLNAC site. Please join NCGLNAC members and friends for a relaxing weekend of learning traditional Native ways, keeping the fire, reconnecting with old friends and making new ones. Please advise Linda Andrews at 765-427-9324 if you are willing to be a fire keeper.

Highlights for the weekend include hiking on the NCGLNAC trail, keeping the fire, completing unfinished projects from earlier cultural arts classes, a rawhide rattle class, dinner Saturday evening prepared by Linda Prather and family, roundtable discussions and community with other participants around the fire. Teresa Webb, Anishinabek, will teach a class on making rawhide rattles from 10 to 4 Saturday, October 25 for age 8 and up. The Saturday evening lecture at 7 p.m. is by Susan Gray of the Ohio War of 1812 Bi-Centennial Commission and discusses Prophet’s Trail in Indiana and Ohio.

Registration begins at 8 a.m. Saturday, October 25, followed by opening circle at 9. Saturday’s lunch is on your own and the Saturday evening feast will be at 6 p.m. The registration fee of \$20 per person for NCGLNAC members and \$30 for non-members includes all activities and the Saturday evening meal. The rawhide rattle class taught by Teresa Webb, which begins at 10, is an additional \$15 for instruction and all materials. Some scholarships are available. Contact Linda Andrews at 765-427-9324. Closing circle will be 12 noon Sunday. *This class is funded in part by Regional Arts Partner Community Foundation of Randolph County, Indiana Arts Commission and the National Endowment for the Arts.*

Rawhide Rattle Class

Women's Building, Jay County Fairgrounds, Portland, Indiana

October 25, 2014 – 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Teresa Webb, Anishinabek, Indiana artist and storyteller will teach a class for age 8 and up on making a rattle from rawhide. Teresa is a regular artist-in-residence at the Eiteljorg Museum of American Indians and Western Art in Indianapolis, telling stories and much more about the Anishinaabe and Potawatomi people and their culture. We are very happy to be able to have Teresa share her vast knowledge with us in this class at the Fall Friendship Fire this year.

Class participants will learn about the history of the Potawatomi people and their use of rattles in their culture. Each student will be able to make their own rattle from rawhide and if time permits decorate it as well in their own way. While class participants are making their rattles, Teresa will engage them in Potawatomi and Anishnaabe stories and culture.

Registration for this class is \$15 (in addition to the \$20 for the Fall Friendship Fire registration). Deadline is October 20 so adequate materials may be obtained. Class is limited to 10 participants. The Center is composed of Native and non-Native members whose mission is to continue and preserve traditional Great Lakes Native American art, history and culture by helping pass those traditions on to Native People and by educating the general public about the importance of Great Lakes Native peoples, their art, history and culture.

The Center has no political agenda. Our focus is on education. We have seen far too many of our treasured elders and tradition bearers begin their Spirit Journey without knowing who would carry on in their place. Additionally, we know too many Native people who are displaced from their tribal land-base and separated from their traditional tribal cultures.

Over the past 16 years, the Center's tribal elders, tradition bearers and members have been presenting

at workshops, symposia, university classrooms, conferences, powwows, elementary schools, libraries and other cultural and educational events. We look forward to helping Native peoples, urban cultural centers, universities, public and private elementary and secondary schools, and the general public raise their awareness and understanding of the cultural heritage and history of Great Lakes Native peoples in an inviting, comfortable place with a friendly learning environment.

NCGLNAC now owns nearly 30 acres (generously donated by the Jay County Fair Board) of beautiful, wooded land, complete with grassland, pond and wetlands, located just north of the Jay County Fairgrounds in Portland. The first ethno-botanical hiking trail is nearing completion and was opened to the public in 2008.
